

CMSA Signs onto Vocational Trucking Letter

RE: Truck and Bus Regulation

Dear Chair Randolph,

Since the implementation of California's landmark Truck and Bus Regulation in 2008 requiring the turnover of the in-use truck fleet operating within the state to update to a model year (MY) 2010 or newer engine, the trucking industry has spent about 10 billion dollars upgrading their vehicles to meet the requirements of the regulation. The reduction in PM 2.5 emissions statewide, especially at port complexes, has been significant.

The end of this year is the final phase of the regulation requiring owners of trucks with MY 2007, 2008 and 2009 engines to upgrade to a MY 2010 or newer engine. During normal economic cycles, this final phase could have been achieved without disruptions in the supply-chain; that is no longer true. Both California's and the nation's economy are still adjusting to the effects from a global pandemic that has stressed supply chains worldwide and more importantly, led to insufficient production of new trucks primarily due to a worldwide shortage in computer chips.

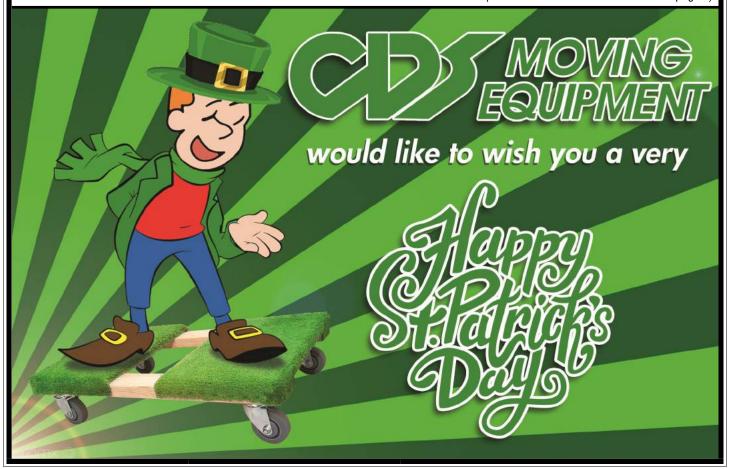
Holy smokes, what just happened with Canada's truckers? The serially polite long haulers seemingly traded civility, courtesy and decorum for blocked borders, a siege of Ottawa and

arrests by armed Mounties. Sacre bleu!

Could California be next? According to law enforcement officials, here are the truck stop warning signs: mullets instantly stylish, Molson tallboys weirdly popular, a preposterous mix of Gordon Lightfoot and Drake serenade fuel pump customers, and worst of all, Bolshevik versions of Bob and Doug McKenzie ("Hoser!") tricking innocent CA truckers into parking big rigs on the Capitol Mall lawns in Sacramento. Without eternal vigilance at the Pilot Flying J, it could happen in CA.

Are there other major concerns California movers and suppliers should be aware of? Glad you asked, Mon Cherie. The CA Truckers Association's ("CTA") case against Sacramento's heavy-handed worker classification law, Assembly Bill 5 ("AB5"), patiently sits on the marble steps outside of the US. Supreme Court waiting for its day in court. You remember AB5; it's the California Legislature's attempt to prevent independent contractors, including motor carriers, from doing business as entrepreneurs in the Golden State. The law includes a presumption of an employment relationship that can only be rebutted by satisfying the nearly impossible "ABC test."

Why stuck on the courthouse steps? The US Department of Justice hasn't responded to the high court's November 15, 2021, request for the Biden administration's position on AB5. According to CTA's CEO Shawn Yadon, "Still no response from the U.S. Solicitor General...While there is no specific deadline for the Solicitor General to submit her filing with the Supreme Court, we should see something submitted sometime during the Spring." The timing is tricky, but, if the Supreme Court decides to hear the case, a Spring or even Fall court date is a (CHAIRMAN'S CORNER continued on page 4)

possibility.

CTA and CMSA hope the high court will strike down AB5 as a violation of the Federal Aviation Act of 1958. However, the justices could just as easily rely on the Court's super precedent as laid down in *Marbury vs. CA Legislative Hubris*.

Another concern is the California Air Resources Board's ("CARB") march to zero emission for vehicles. Lofty goals and deadlines have been set. But, *who pays for it?* CARB has a secret: the expense of emissions compliance won't be limited to the vehicle's owner.

According to CARB's language in the "Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation Prepared Draft Regulation Language" (September 2021), the "controlling party" bears the responsibility and expense.

Furthermore, from CARB: "...a vehicle is considered to be under an entity's control if that entity operates the vehicle using that entity's state or federal operating authority or other registration...displaying the same name or logo, or contractors who represent the same company are considered to be under common ownership or control."

To borrow a phrase from syndicated communist Joe Bob Briggs: "Communist Double Alert!" I'm no regulatory wizard, but the expense for CARB compliance could potentially be paid by any company using an independent contractor model in CA. The well documented shortage of new truck availability has forced larger fleets to hold onto their older trucks for longer than is typical which in-turn has reduced the amount of used trucks in the secondary market causing prices of available trucks to skyrocket¹. In fact, ACT Research has reported that average used truck prices are currently up 83 percent compared to January 2021.

CARB's own data shows that more than 40,000 heavy duty trucks will no longer be able to operate on California highways beginning in 2023. That number grows to over 80,000 if all classes of diesel-powered trucks are included above 14,000 pounds. Truck owners unable to locate or purchase affordable used trucks will be forced from the marketplace, adding to the supply-chain difficulties that are a significant factor in the inflationary pressures facing our economy.

We request the California Air Resources Board (CARB) institute a one-year pause in the final phase of the Truck and Bus Regulation in order to allow truck markets to "hopefully" return to pre-pandemic levels of availability and more importantly affordability.

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California Set to Reassert Itself as Leader in Battle Against Emissions

The Biden administration is moving to restore California's legal power to lead the nation in stifling auto emissions and accelerating the transition to electric vehicles.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is poised to issue a new waiver empowering the most populous state to mandate zero-emission vehicles and enforce its own stringent limits on greenhouse gas emissions from vehicle tailpipes. The

action, which would reverse a Trump-era decision to curtail California's power, is expected within days, said people familiar with the matter who were not authorized to speak about the effort.

"EPA is working to finalize a decision on

the California waiver" that is "consistent with

its obligations under the Clean Air Act," EPA spokesman Nick Conger said by email. The agency "expects to issue a decision in the near future."

The shift would once again put California in the driver's seat when it comes to environmental policy. Under the Clean Air Act, the state has special treatment to set air pollution policies that are tougher than those of the federal

government. More than a dozen other states, representing more than a third of the U.S. vehicle market, have chosen to adhere to California's emission limits.

After the EPA began formally considering

the waiver's reinstatement last year, Democrats urged the administration to move swiftly, arguing that state leadership is essential to spur innovation in clean vehicles.

"Reinstating the California waiver means that 17 states and the District of Columbia, representing more than 120 million people and over one-third of the automotive market, can once again exercise their right to safeguard communities from transportation pollution," environmental group Earthjustice said in an emailed statement.

Some conservatives argue the shift gives California too much power and will limit consumer choice. California, long considered the vanguard of American environmentalism, is honing a policy banning the sale of conventional gasoline-powered cars.

A reinstated waiver will result in more stringent fuel economy standards "as well as more widespread and aggressive zeroemission vehicle mandates," the Competitive Enterprise Institute said in written comments to the EPA. "Those more stringent policies will increase new car prices and further limit consumer choice by restricting the availability of larger, heavier cars and nonelectric vehicles."

But environmental advocates urging a quicker shift to electric vehicles have vowed to pressure California leaders to seize the state's restored power and move more aggressively.

"This decision begins to undo the damage from the Trump years," Scott Hochberg, a transportation attorney at the Center for Biological Diversity's Climate Law Institute, said in an emailed statement. "But it's only meaningful if California uses its unique power to lead the nation with the deep emissions cuts the climate crisis demands."

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Non-Temp Storage Submission Information

5.1. Rate Submission.

5.1.1. Rates will be submitted by the NTS TSP on the Schedule of Services and Rates for Personal Property found in Attachment B. Rate submissions may be filed each calendar quarter defined as 01 January thru 31 March, 01 April thru 30 June, 01 July thru 30 September, 01 October thru 31 December. Rate submissions must be received by e-mail no later than the 15th of the 2nd month of the current quarter to be effective the following quarter as follows:

- 5.1.1.1. Quarter 1 Received by 15 November, effective 01 January
- 5.1.1.2. Quarter 2 Received by 15 February, effective 01 April
- 5.1.1.3. Quarter 3 Received by 15 May, effective 01 July

5.1.1.4. Quarter 4 – Received by 15 August, effective 01 October

- 5.1.2. Rates submitted and accepted will remain in effect until revised as provided herein. Revised rates will be incorporated into the TOS by modification. Each rate item is considered individually. When proposed rate changes result in prolonged negotiations, the above time frame may not be effective and may be subject to delay. The Government will process all proposed rate changes as expeditiously as possible. In order to meet administrative needs, the Storage Program Manager is obligated to accept or reject the rate change in order to allow time for input into the WHIST/TOPS program. The Government reserves the right to designate a specific due date if a mass response for changes of rates or services is anticipated.
- 5.1.3. NTS TSP must submit offers for all zones and on all items enumerated in the Schedule of Services and Rates for Personal Property in section 2. If there is to be no charge for an item, an entry such as "No Charge", or the letters "NC", must be made in the unit price column of the schedule. If the NTS TSP does not have operating authority for a zone listed on the schedule, an entry of "No Operating Authority" or "NOA" must be entered in the unit price column of the rate schedule. When rate schedules are filed at more than one installation, the rates for Item I Packing, Item II Wardrobes/Hi-Value Items, Item IV Handling-In, Item V Storage, Item VI Handling-Out and Item VIII Unpacking, must be the same for each installation. For example, the price of Item I must be identical to the price for Item I in a second rate schedule submitted for another installation.
- 5.1.4. NTS TSP must submit a properly completed Certificate of Independent Price Determination (Attachment E) with all rate filings.
- 5.1.5. The rate schedule is intended to be all inclusive. Payment for unusual service requirements may be approved by the Transportation Officer, in writing, in advance, depending on the specifics of the individual move.

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Inflation is on the rise: Will the other shoe fall?

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics recently released its most-updated data regarding inflation and spending trends in the U.S. The numbers are historically bad. The rate of inflation has hit a 40-year high. Across the nation, people are reeling as inflation continues to climb. The consumer price index, which measures the cost of dozens of items used by Americans each day, was up a startling 7.5 percent year over year. The trend continues in 2022 with an additional rise in January of 0.06 percent. This is unsustainable inflation.

Rising inflation naturally hits lower and middle-income families the hardest. People on a fixed income, like senior citizens, are especially vulnerable. For example, shelter costs, which represent close to one-third of all costs measured in the data, were up 4.1 percent last year. That pace marks the fastest spike in 15 years. Many people are feeling the burn from the high inflation hikes. A recent economic analysis showed that the average US household is spending \$276.00/month more due to inflation. According to Ryan Sweet, a senior economist at of Moody Analytics—"that's a big burden." Mr. Sweet compiled his data by comparing what the average household spent under 7.5% inflation versus the amount it would have spent when inflation was 2.1%, the average difference in 2018 and 2019.

Dan Siracusa, President of Siracusa Moving and Storage, stated "it is a bit like the wild wild west right now as the pricing for materials has really spiked–particularly as it pertains to the plastics for products like shrink wrap and tape where costs have risen some 20 percent in the last 60 days...if you can even get the product."

Dan went on to say, "movers that have a high concentration of national accounts are being hurt badly now if they are not able to negotiate price increases to their existing contracts with corporations or relocation management companies."

According to Eric Scorzelli of Victory

The past two years have been difficult, but as always movers rose to the challenges and persevered. Throughout it all, the CMSA kept our industry connected and informed.

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Packaging, a packaging supplier to the industry:

Virtually all products have had an increase in 2021. Early in 2021, there was a paper shortage, and now this seems to be partially recovering. As it pertains to plastics, like stretch film and tape, as a distributor Victory used to be able to work off a very predictable lead times of fourweeks to manage inventory...now this is closer to four months. At this point, Victory has been proactive to address these supply chain delays cutting out shortages. We have been pre-building our inventory by buying much more than in the past and warehousing this inventory. We now have over 5 million square feet of warehousing space, plus we are partnering with movers in certain markets for additional warehousing space. Pricing will continue to go up, there is no doubt due to the rising costs of fuel, labor, and transportation costs.

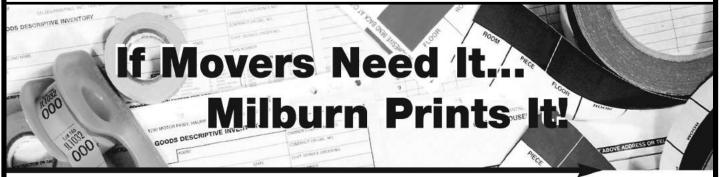
Ted Edwards of Movers Supply House, a supplier of new and used trucks to the industry, said:

I have been in the industry 35 years, and I have never seen such a challenging time. If you placed an order for a truck today, you might receive delivery in September or October. In the past, you could place an order today- and have the truck in time for the moving season. They now have no trucks available. The four major chassis manufacturers are International, Freightliner, Hino, and Mack and it is very difficult to get a chassis. Many of these firms have cut the allocations (the number of truck bodies they will provide) in 2022 by 40 percent due to supply chain issues. There is massive demand-if someone is not making money now, they are doing something wrong.

Conclusions:

• The pandemic has clearly revealed the

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A Cautionary Tale By CMSA President Steve Weitekamp

I know that many of you are like me, in that you have out-of-area friends and colleagues who are moving and assume you can't help them until they run into trouble. Or even worse, call you for advice and recommendations then do the complete opposite anyways! If I were still selling moving, I might share



the following with anyone considering "more economical methods." The names have been changed to protect those who failed to listen in the first place!

A friend, Nick, more like someone I knew for a short time 30 years ago, sent me a message on social media. Hey Steve, I'm moving from the Pacific Northwest to a Southern State and want your advice on moving. A reasonable request as I run the largest state moving association and moving -related pieces make up a good part of my social media presence.

When someone asks for help, the very first thing I want them to understand is that there are very bad actors online who represent themselves as movers, but are really scammers, and make promises that a real mover can't. The reason they can do this is not because they are "Disruptors" who have found a better and more cost-effective way of moving your household goods from point A to point B. The reason they can give better pricing and service dates is that they are liars and have absolutely no intention of standing behind any of their promises. In fact, they know as they convince you to electronically transfer your significant deposit (red flag) that not one cent of this deposit will be applied to the cost of your move!

Nick is an intelligent guy, I mean he has a significant job as an Information Technology guy at a large company, so I assumed he understood what I shared about scammers attacking consumers in our industry. I then shared a referral of a quality interstate mover in his relatively remote area, I felt very confident with the recommendation as the mover is a longtime friend and someone, I would feel comfortable moving my own family. The mover conducted a professional survey of Nick's goods and gave him a detailed break-

down of the services and costs of his potential move. The mover and his salesperson even called me to discuss general issues related to the move. I felt comfortable that I had done my good deed in connecting a quality mover with a consumer in need. At that point, I thought the story was over.

Several weeks later, I received an email from Nick, "I'm in trouble and could really use your help." He stated that he wished he would have taken my advice and wrote, "We were on the hook at the company we went with at the time you gave me advice." The "broker" they went with hired some pirates who took two days to pack their home this past week, and as they were all done loading and closed the trucks up, they told him that their \$17k non-binding estimate would be \$29k. They then told Nick they were taking his things to a warehouse in Washington, and it would be 10-21 days before he'd get his stuff. The broker originally told him he'd have his stuff by this Sunday. He put a tracker in one of his boxes and found out that they put the stuff in storage a couple of blocks from his house. So, he called the police who intercepted them. Thankfully, this is possible in a small town, most have far less luck in a metropolitan area. Incidental to the police stop, one of the four movers was a fugitive wanted in Texas for parole violations after aggravated robbery convictions. So, they arrested him. Through the police process, the movers agreed to put the stuff
